PROFILE OF THE INSTITUTION


Located at Upper New Colony, Laitumkhrah and operating from a compact, calm, serene and secure campus, Women's College, Shillong, an Education India Trust-sponsored linguistic minority institution was established in 1984. Aided by a band of committed faculty, the institute, since inception, has been striving hard to translate its maxim Abirabirma Edhi (Radiance unto All) into reality through the spread of education amongst women, in particular, the tribal women belonging to India's north-east. Standing tall as one of the premiere institutions in the state of Meghalaya, the institute is privy today to draw students from the neighbouring SAARC countries. Offering regular academic courses of Semester System (Honours) in the Arts and applied stream of studies, the institute, a private aided centre of learning, is affiliated to the North Eastern Hill University (NEHU), Shillong.

Students joining this course exit with the degree of Bachelor of Social Work (BSW) awarded under the stamp of its affiliating university.

The Institute offers the Bachelor's degree programme in Social Work (BSW).



The overall progress of each student is monitored using ward sheets. Attention of parents, whenever required, is drawn.

Code of Conduct for the Students:

- 1. Use of **drugs**, **chewing betel nut** and **tobacco** is strictly **prohibited** within the college premises.
- 2. Use of **cell phones** is **barred in the examination hall.**
- 3. Sobriety and modesty in matters of dress and general behaviour must be maintained.
- 4. Conduct must foster and preserve communal harmony in letter and spirit.
- 5. **Littering, damaging** and/or **defacing** college property is a **punishable offence** and monetary compensation shall be charged if found indulging in such act.
- 6. While in campus, students must wear their duly signed College Identity Card without fail.
- 7. Students whose attendance fall below **75% of the total lectures**, would be **debarred** from appearing in the University examinations.
- 8. Students are required to submit their **Migration Certificates** within **fifteen (15)** days counted from the date of admission.
- 9. Students would have to produce a **No Outstanding Certificate** from the college library before being allowed to fill in the **end semester examination forms**.
- 10. Students are required to make formal request for the issuance of **Transfer Certificate** (if required). Issuance of TC would be subject to **clearing of all college dues** by the applicant.
- 11. The college authority shall not be responsible for any **misconduct /misbehaviour** outside the college premises. The institute expects its students to remember that **non-compliance** to the **rules and regulations, violation of any of the conduct norms** and any act of **indiscipline** is liable to attract penal action in terms of fine and/or even expulsion from the college if the **Discipline Committee** of the college so decides.

Important:

Strict adherence to the college rules and regulations is a must and any violation of these may lead to even expulsion of the concerned student.

UGC REGULATION ON CURBING THE MENACE OF RAGGING

In exercise of the powers conferred by Clause (g) of Sub-Section

(1) of Section 26 of the University Grants Commission Act, 1956, the University Grants Commission hereby makes the following Regulations, namely:

Title, commencement and applicability:

These regulations shall be called the "UGC Regulations on Curbing the Menace of Ragging in Higher Educational Institutions 2009". They shall come into force with immediate effect.

They shall apply to all the universities established or incorporated by or under a Central Act, a Provincial Act or a State Act, to all institutions deemed to be university under Section 3 of the UGC Act, 1956, to all other higher educational institutions, including the departments, constituent units and all the premises (academic, residential, sports, canteen, etc) of such universities, deemed universities and other higher educational institutions, whether located within the campus or outside, and to all means of transportation of students whether public or private.

To root out ragging in all its forms from universities, colleges and other educational institutions in the country by prohibiting it by law, preventing its occurrence by following the provisions of these Regulations and punishing those who indulge in ragging as provided for in these Regulations and the appropriate law in force.

Measures for prohibition of ragging at the Institution level

The College shall strictly observe the provisions of the Act, thereby ragging in all its forms shall be totally banned in the entire institution.

The institution shall take strict action against those found guilty of ragging and /or of abetting ragging.

- 3. On completion of the payment of fees, the **bill book** must be produced at the **College office** along with a **photocopy of the transaction**.
- 4. Student Identity Card and the Bill Book shall have to be procured from the designated office counter on cash payment.

- 5. All Fees are liable to revision as and when such need arises.
- 6. Refund of library caution money shall be made to the students only after successful completion of the course.
- 7. Refund of caution money shall be made against application produced by the student along with a photocopies of Identity Card and the College Bill book within 6 months of the declaration of the final results.

In the event of any student losing her **ID card** and, /or **Bill Book**, **duplicate ID card** and/or Bill Book may be issued subject to verification of records and payment.
