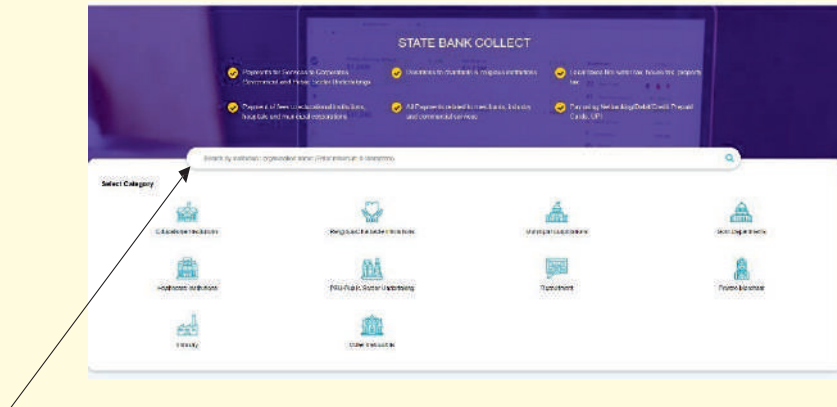

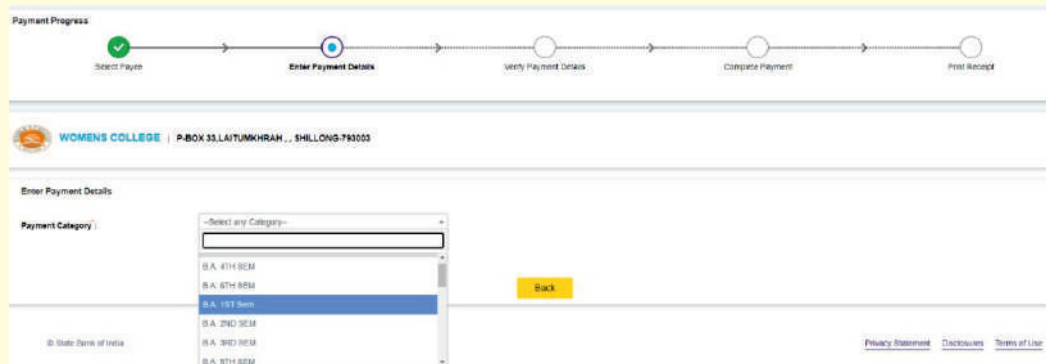

2. On completion of the payment of fees, the **bill book** must be produced at the **College office** along with a **photocopy of the transaction**.
3. Student Identity Card and the Bill Book shall have to be procured from the designated office counter on cash payment.
4. In the event of any student losing her **ID card** and, /or **Bill Book**, **duplicate ID card** and/or Bill Book may be issued subject to verification of records and payment.

CODE OF CONDUCT FOR THE STUDENTS:

1. Drugs, betel nut and tobacco are strictly prohibited within the college premises.
2. Use of cell phones in the campus is barred by law and any violation of this would lead to penal action.
3. Sobriety and modesty in matters of dress and general behaviour must be maintained.
4. Conduct must foster and preserve communal harmony in letter and spirit.
5. Littering, damaging and/or defacing property is a punishable offence and monetary compensation shall be charged if found indulging in such act.
6. While in campus, students must wear their duly signed College Identity Card without fail.
7. Students whose attendance falls below 75% of the total classes would be debarred from appearing in the University examination.
8. Students are required to submit their Migration Certificates, if required within fifteen (15) days of the date of admission.
9. Students have to produce a No Outstanding Certificate from the college library before being allowed to fill in the end semester examination forms.
10. Students are required to make formal request for the issuance of Transfer Certificate (TC) (if required). Issuance of TC would be subject to clearing of all dues by the applicant.
11. The college authority shall not be responsible for any misconduct /misbehavior outside the college premises. The institute expects its students to note that non-compliance to the rules and regulations, violation of any of the conduct norms and any act of indiscipline is liable to attract penal action in terms of fine and/or even expulsion from the college if the Discipline Committee of the college so decides.

NOTE:

Strict adherence to the college rules and regulations is a must and any violation of these may lead to expulsion of the concerned student.

ANTI-RAGGING NORMS

In exercise of the powers conferred by Clause (g) of Sub-Section (1) of Section 26 of the University Grants Commission Act, 1956, the University Grants Commission hereby makes the following Regulations, namely: Title, commencement and applicability:

These regulations shall be called the "UGC Regulations on Curbing the Menace of Ragging in Higher Educational Institutions 2009".

They shall come in to force with immediate effect.

They shall apply to all the universities established or incorporated by or under a Central Act, a Provincial Act or a State Act, to all institutions deemed to be university under Section 3 of the UGC Act, 1956, to all other higher educational institutions, including the departments, constituent units and all the premises (academic, residential, sports, canteen, etc.) of such universities, deemed universities and other higher educational institutions, whether located within the campus or outside, and to all means of transportation of students whether public or private.

To root out ragging in all its forms from universities, colleges and other educational institutions in the country by prohibiting it by law, preventing its occurrence by following the provisions of these Regulations and punishing those who indulge in ragging as provided for in these Regulations and the appropriate law in force.

MEASURES FOR PROHIBITION OF RAGGING AT THE INSTITUTION

The College shall strictly observe the provisions of the Act, there by ragging in all its forms shall be totally banned in the entire institution.

The institution shall take strict action against those found guilty of ragging and/or of a betting ragging.

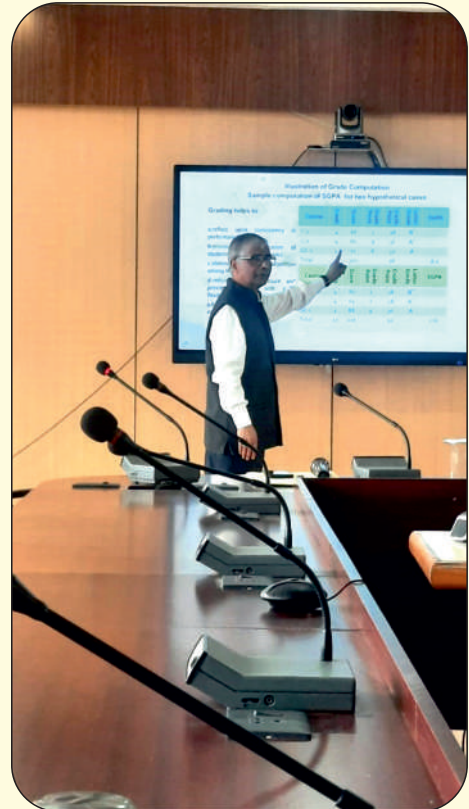
