The National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) has accredited the institution

thrice, a testament to the institution's commitment to consistently providing a standard of education. Recognising the need for holistic development, the institution is committed to fostering the overall growth of its students. This commitment is realised through a comprehensive approach, encompassing a well-equipped computer facility, a dedicated skills development hub, value education aligned with NEP requirements, and a digitised library offering a vast collection of e-resources for efficient access to information. - Applicants seeking admission to the BSW Course must qualify for the 10 + 2 examination/Equivalent conducted by any recognised board. Students who have completed a Degree examination in any other programme are also eligible for admission to this course.

The overall progress of each student is monitored using ward sheets. Parents are informed of relevant matters concerning their children through parent-teacher meetings.

SKILLS HUB (6 MONTHS CERTIFICATE COURSES)

NEP 2020 focuses on skill development programmes that support beginners by bringing innovative skills and technologies for a better lifestyle, which would create sustainable and visible social impact in the long run.

Code of Conduct for the Students:

- 1. Use of drugs, chewing betel nut and tobacco is strictly prohibited within the college premises.
- 2. Cell phone use on campus is barred by law, and any violation will result in penal action.
- 3. Sobriety and modesty in matters of dress and general behaviour must be maintained.
- 4. Conduct must foster and preserve communal harmony in letter and spirit.
- 5. Littering, damaging, and/or defacing properly is a punishable offence, and monetary compensation will be charged if you are found indulging in such acts.
- 6. While on campus, students must wear their duly signed College Identity Card without fail.
- 7. Students whose attendance falls below 75% of the total classes would be debarred from appearing in the University examination.
- 8. Students must submit their Migration Certificates within fifteen (15) days from admission.
- 9. Students would have to produce a No Outstanding Certificate from the college library before being allowed to fill in the end-semester examination forms.
- 10. Students are required to make formal requests for the issuance of a Transfer Certificate (TC) (if needed). The issuance of a TC is subject to the applicant clearing all dues.
- 11. The college authority shall not be responsible for any misconduct /misbehaviour outside the college premises. The institute expects its students to remember that non-compliance with the rules and regulations, violation of any of the conduct norms, and any act of indiscipline are liable to attract penal action in terms of fine and/or even expulsion from the college if the college's Discipline Committee decides so.

NOTE:

Strict adherence to the college rules and regulations is a must, and any violation of these may even lead to the expulsion of the student concerned.

ANTI-RAGGING NORMS

In exercise of the powers conferred by Clause(g) of Sub-Section (1) of Section 26 of the University Grants Commission Act, 1956, the University Grants Commission hereby makes the following Regulations, namely: Title, commencement and applicability:

These regulations shall be called the "UGC Regulations on Curbing the Menace of Ragging in Higher Educational Institutions2009".

They shall come into force with immediate effect.

They shall apply to all the universities established or incorporated by or under a Central Act, a Provincial Act or a State Act, to all institutions deemed to be universities under Section 3 of the UGC Act, 1956, to all other higher educational institutions, including the departments, constituent units and all the premises (academic, residential, sports, canteen, etc.) of such universities, deemed universities and other higher educational institutions, whether located within the campus or outside and to all means of transportation of students whether public or private. To root out ragging in all its forms from universities, colleges and other educational institutions in the country by prohibiting it by law, preventing its occurrence by following the provisions of these Regulations and punishing those who indulge in ragging as provided for in these Regulations and the appropriate law in force.

Measures for prohibition of ragging at the Institution level:

The College shall strictly observe the provisions of the Act; thereby, ragging in all its forms shall be banned in the entire institution.

The institution shall take strict action against those found guilty of ragging and/or abetting ragging.

PAYMENT OF FEES

- 1. The Semester Fees are to be cleared at the time of admission.
- 2. All fees and dues payable to the college must be paid online. Refer to pages 9 and 10.
- 3. Student Identity Cards and the Bill Book shall be procured from the designated office counter on cash payment.
 - i. Identity Card 100/-
 - ii. Bill Book 100/-
- 4. All college fees are subject to revision as and when such need arises.
- 5. Students obtaining 45% and above are awarded a degree with honours. Students obtaining less than the stipulated 45% are awarded a Simple Pass Degree.

Library caution money will be refunded to students only after successful completion of the course. The refund will be issued against the application produced by the student, along with a photocopy of the identity card and the college bill book, within six months of the declaration of the final semester results.

If any student loses her ID card and/or Bill Book, a duplicate card and/or Bill Book may be issued, subject to verification of records and payment.

DEFINITIONS

Programme: NEHU offers a four-year undergraduate programme (FYUP). There will be two UG programmes, viz.

- i) UG degree programme with a single major,
- ii) Multidisciplinary

UG programme.

Discipline: As defined by UGC. Five broad disciplines are

- (i) Natural and Physical Sciences,
- (ii) Mathematics, Statistics, and Computer Sciences,
- (iii) Library, Information, and Media Sciences,
- (iv) Commerce and Management, and
- (v) Humanities and Social Sciences.

Subject: The branches within a discipline. For example, Botany, Zoology, Biotechnology, Biochemistry, Chemistry, Physics, Biophysics, Astronomy and Astrophysics are subjects in Natural and Physical Science disciplines.

Courses: Courses are the papers required to complete a programme. For a 3-year UG degree, a student must earn 120 credit hours. A FYUP requires a total of 160 credit hours. Course number indicates the difficulty level of the course as shown below:

- 100 -199= Introductory level courses
- 200 299 = Intermediate level courses
- 300 399 = High level courses
- 400-499 = Advance level courses

Core courses: The course related to basic disciplines. For FYUP with a single major, 80 credits must be earned from the major and 20 credits from the minor discipline. For the Multidisciplinary FYUG programme, 72 credits from the core courses must be earned from three or more subjects with a minimum of 12 credits from one subject to get a 3-year UG degree.

Credit: Weightage of a course with defined contact hours. To be awarded the defined credits, a student must clear a course with a minimum 'P' letter grade and a grade point of 4. A student with grade points ranging from 4 to 10 will earn the same credit for a given course. 40% of the credits in any category may be earned through online courses approved by the Board of Studies (BOS) as per the existing UGC regulations. No course with a practicum can be earned online.

Exam weightage: As per NEHU rule.

1. UG degree programme with single major Major: The Major is a subject in a core discipline. In the Major, students must earn 60 credit hours in 3 years and 80 credits in 4 years.

Minor (core course): The Minor (core course) is a subject in a core discipline. In the Minor (core course), students must earn 12 credit hours in 3 years and 20 credit hours in 4 years. Minor discipline helps a student to gain a broader understanding beyond the major discipline.

Honours: The discipline of focus where a student must earn 92 credit hours in the discipline out of a total of 160 credit hours of the programme. Only those students who secure a minimum of 75% marks in the MAJOR subject will be allowed to take a Research Project/Dissertation and be awarded "UG Honours with Research" upon securing the required credits. The remaining students must opt for advanced courses to be awarded a "UG Honours."

Honours with Research: An Honours with 92 credit hours in the discipline, including 12 credit hours from research project/dissertation.
